## Arusha to host new law institution banky NEW FEB 17, 2015

TO cement the concept that Arusha is 'The Hague of Africa,' a new international institution akin to foreign laws in relation to continental affairs has been inaugurated in the city.

The African Institute of International Law (AIIL) is the brainchild of the African Foundation for International Law and was established in close collaboration between AFIL and the Government of Tanzania. It was officially inaugurated in Arusha on Monday.

"Many African countries achieved their independence about 50 years ago on average, but are still far from adopting many of the international laws and legal regulations," stated Judge Abdulqavi Yusuf, the Vice-President

of the International Court of

According to Justice Yusuf, who is also the President of the Curatorium of the African Institute of International Law, it is now time for African states to become active participants in international law.

Partially, the reason is that globalisation has forced many foreign laws to encroach into the most reserved areas previously restricted for traditional, domestic or national laws.

"Arusha was chosen to host the African Institute of International Law because the city has the highest concentration of judicial systems on the continent; starting with the East African Court of Justice (EACJ).

The city is also host to the United Nations' International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda, the African Court for People and Human Rights and is

soon set to host African court of justice," said Judge Yusuf. He was on view that with

all those legal chambers of international calibre based in Arusha it all left for a specialised inter-continental legal training institution to complement the city's position as 'The Hague of Africa.

Thus the establishment of the AIIL, which for a while will be hosted at the Arusha International Conference Centre (AICC) complex.

Inaugurating the Institute, the Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, Dr Mahadhi Juma Maalim, said Tanzania welcomes the noble initiative of the African Institute of International Law which will play a key role in the continent in creating deeper appreciation and understanding of international law.

"AIIL will enhance Africans' knowledge and expertise in international law so that we reduce our dependant on external experts in our own matters.

"There is no doubt that the African Institute of International Law will play a big role to provide Africa with well-trained human resources and Tanzania shall extend all necessary support to this initiative," he said.

AIIL establishment was endorsed by the Assembly of Heads of States and Governments of the African Union, which underscored its strategic and unique role as a Pan African institution.

Similarly, the United Nations General Assembly welcomed the creation of the Institute and encouraged the UN Secretariat to cooperate with it through the Codification Division of the Office of

Legal Affairs.

Among the Institut mandate it to promote a research and analysis of ternational legal matter particular interest and evance to African courand to foster the teaching dissemination of internal law in Africa and provice tensive training on Bil Investment Treaties and Arbitration.

AIIL will also servencourage and promote lectual debate and excha on international legal i of particular interest to A and its peoples.

It will also fomen establishment of netv among African internat lawyers as well as bet the latter and scholars of continents and contribut tively to the promotion building of the rule of la Africa, in general.
